

Identity Theft is a crime in which someone obtains and uses another person's personal information in a way that involves fraud or deception.

The most common ways to commit identity theft are theft of mail and mailbox break-in, intercepting bank and credit card information from your garbage, theft of your I.D./wallet/purse to sell your I.D., ATM and Pin Pad fraud.

Your information is used for withdrawals and purchases using your credit and bank information, establishing new fraudulent accounts in your name, renting or buying property under your name, accessing your EI, Pension or Social Assistance, illegal entry into Canada and to use forged documents. **The best way to avoid identity theft is to prevent it.**

Identity Theft Prevention

- Never provide personal or family information over the telephone or by e-mailing when responding to requests made by banks, credit card companies, or other types of institutions.
- Do not share your PIN or other passwords with anyone.
- Do not carry unnecessary identification such as passports and SIN cards.
- Look out for false fronts on bank machines and report anything suspicious.
- Do not let your card out of sight and if possible, swipe the debit card yourself.

What Should You Do If You Have Become a Victim

- Notify your bank/credit card company right away—Cancel/Change accounts.
- 2. Contact the Police Non-Emergency line (604-717-3321). Make a police report and get a file # for your records.
- 3. Notify national credit card companies to flag your account for identity theft—Equifax : 1-800-465-7166 (www.equifax.ca) or Transunion: 1-877-525-3823 (www.tuc.ca).
