When Jeremy Borsos and his wife, Sus, took on the remediation of the Blue Cabin, we at grunt never expected what would eventually come out of it! Using historical materials, they took the structure apart, methodically cleaned every inch, and replaced the rotted-out bits. They insulated the walls and fixed the floor. Essentially, they treated it as an archaeological site, collecting its history in scraps of newspapers and mouse nests and, in an archival process, painstakingly saved what remained. The humble structure revealed itself slowly over the six-month period of the restoration and culminated – when they took up the floor – in the discovery of almost 40 posters that had been put there in 1927 to prevent the floor from squeaking.

In this exhibition, the Borsos' present a body of work that documents this journey, while providing us a history of the cabin before Al Neil and Carole Itter's tenancy, and offering us new insights into the earlier inhabitants— squatters, and marine workers on the foreshore.

ABOUT THE ARTISTS:

Jeremy Borsos studied at the Emily Carr School of Art and later attended the Art Students League in New York where he studied 19th-century classical painting. He worked in many facets of the motion picture production before enlarging this to a multidisciplinary practice that includes architecture, writing, photography, installation, painting, and video. In his works, ephemeral histories are redefined through a course of material discovery and translated through the language and dialects of the archive. He exhibits his works nationally and internationally.

Sus Borsos was born in Denmark and moved to Canada in 1992, where she built a home with Jeremy created from salvaged architectural fragments. Since then, she has worked in multiple creative capacities, including digital film and sound editing, and the design and construction of multiple residences. Beginning in 2018 she will design and rebuild a studio and living space with Jeremy in Greece.

Together, Sus and Jeremy have constructed a number of buildings using period architectural salvage. They have most recently completed a full remediation of the Blue Cabin, the studio component of a soon-to-be-launched floating artist residency in Vancouver, Canada. Among Jeremy and Sus' current creative projects is the redesigning and rebuilding of a studio and living space in Athens, Greece. They live and work on Mayne Island, British Columbia, and in Athens, Greece.

The Blue Cabin project is led by grunt gallery, along with Other Sights for Artists Projects, and Creative Cultural Collaborations (C3).

EMILY CARR IN DIALOGUE WITH MATTIE GUNTERMAN

On view until September 3, 2018

Emily Carr in Dialogue with Mattie Gunterman unites the work of two women artists practicing in British Columbia in the early twentieth century. Presenting the paintings of Emily Carr with forty-eight photographs by US-born photographer Mattie Gunterman, this exhibition draws on the Gallery's deep holdings of Carr's work to reflect her engagement and affection for BC's landscape. Like Carr, much of Gunterman's oeuvre reflects her engagement with the BC wilderness around her, which she documented after settling in the Province in 1898. Family, friends, trappers, prospectors, miners and Gunterman herself are among the subjects featured, providing a fascinating look into her daily life.

CABIN FEVER

On view until September 30, 2018

Cabin Fever traces the history of the North American cabin as an architectural form and cultural construct. From rustic sanctuary described in Thoreau's Walden (1854) to minimalist homestead popularized by websites such as Cabin Porn, the North American cabin and its connotations have evolved over centuries. This exhibition traces the cabin's evolution through renderings, artworks and commercial products as well as architectural models, plans and full-scale installations, surveying this iconic yet humble lodging's utility, adulation and prevalence in Canada and the US.

DAVID MILNE: MODERN PAINTING

June 16 to September 9, 2018

The Vancouver Art Gallery in collaboration with Dulwich Picture Gallery and the McMichael Canadian Art Collection, with support from the National Gallery of Canada, presents *David Milne: Modern Painting.* Milne (1882 – 1953) enjoyed a career that spanned half the twentieth century, taking him from the bustling cityscape of New York, to the battlefields of Northern France and Belgium, and back to the wilderness of the Canadian and US landscape. During his progression as a painter, he carved out a distinguished place among Canada's most original artists. The first major showing of Milne's work in the country in thirty years, coming direct from its recent European debut in London, this exhibition features close to ninety works in oil and watercolour, as well as never-before-presented photographs, drawings and memorabilia.

SITE UNSEEN

June 16 to September 9, 2018

Following *David Milne: Modern Painting*, which examines Milne's innovative depiction of the landscape, *Site Unseen* similarly considers artists' use of the landscape—both urban and rural—through photography, film and video. Its artists push the boundaries of their medium by introducing visual distortions or chromatic disturbances resulting from their singular processes to produce images that are uncanny—simultaneously of this world and alien. Artists include Laura Dutton, Marten Elder, Lorraine Gilbert, Rodney Graham, Mark Lewis, Thomas Ruff, and Diana Thater.

AYUMI GOTO & PETER MORIN: HOW DO YOU CARRY THE LAND? July 14 to October 28, 2018

Ayumi Goto and Peter Morin: how do you carry the land? is a dialogue between two artists, presented via their individual and collaborative performance art practice. Goto and Morin's work begins from thinking through their respective positions as a Japanese diasporic woman and Tahltan First Nation man in terms of deep ancestral knowledges and the ways in which their bodies and experiences are inscribed by colonialism. The exhibition weaves together a selection of Goto and Morin's collaborative performances along with significant solo projects. Drawing from Tahltan Nation knowledge, drums, rattles, masks and other forms of cultural production are embedded with the potential to be re-activated in new contexts and in continuity with the past.

KEVIN SCHMIDT: WE ARE THE ROBOTS

July 14 to October 28, 2018

British Columbia—based artist Kevin Schmidt draws upon aspects of conceptual and performance art while embodying the do-it-yourself (DIY) sensibilities of an amateur inventor. *Kevin Schmidt: We Are the Robots* takes its focus from his work *DIY Hifi* (2014), which the Vancouver Art Gallery is proud to present for the first time in North America. In it, Schmidt presents an audiophile listening room featuring gigantic stereo

speakers, a kit tube amp and furniture built by Schmidt using plans posted by online audiophiles and published in DIY manuals. Visitors can bring in their own vinyl and listen to it in the Gallery. We Are the Robots also includes new sculpture and video works in which Schmidt presents other DIY experiments, such as the reconfiguration of a home appliance to generate power in the wilderness and the attention-getting potential of LED light strips placed on the Gallery's exterior.

SHIGERU BAN, PAPER LOG HOUSE, 2018, sitespecific installation at Vancouver Art Gallery Offsite, May 11 to October 8, 2018

A new exhibition at **Vancouver Art Gallery**'s *Offsite* location (1100 West Georgia Street) features a full-scale version of renowned Japanese architect Shigeru Ban's Kobe Paper Log House. Following Japan's 1995 earthquake, Ban who is Founder of the Voluntary Architects Network, designed the Kobe Paper Log House as disaster relief shelter with his extensive knowledge of recyclable materials, particularly of paper and cardboard. This exhibition also showcases a large photomural documenting Ban's ongoing design work on global disaster relief projects – work that in 2017 earned him the Mother Theresa Award.

I Don't Get It is a new body of work by Cohene that pushes at the limits of what is Legible within the homogeneity of contemporary white Hollywood cinema.

STSTS is a site-specific public installation by Maggie Groat that includes sculptural assemblage, a publication, and a series of public programs in collaboration with local artists. Groat works towards an associative consideration of the shifting histories and possible futures of the site of the Western Front, a building which rests upon the embankment of a now under grounded creek and the traditional unceded territory of the Musqueam, Squamish and Tsleil-Waututh.

ON TRIAL THE LONG DOORWAY - DEANNA BOWEN July

In partnership with the Contemporary Art Gallery, Western Front will host Deanna Bowen to support the post-production of her newest work On Trial The Long Doorway. Combining historical research with strategies of reenactment, dramaturgy, and performance the project continues Bowen's interest in activating over lokked and forgotten histories of race relations in Canada, taking as its starting point the 1956

CBC teleplay of the same name.

THE STILL LIVING END - VINCENT CHEVALIER July 15 - August 5

The Still Living End is a nostalgic revisitation of Gregg Araki's 1992 film The Living End, executed through a recreation of its theatrical properties. A lush yet haunting living painting featuring a collection of objects set on an overflowing prop table. Feminist Land Art Retreat (FLAR) is a conceptual project that provokes reflection on relief, escape and wildness within contemporary life. FLAR draws upon the visual and linguistic iconography of advertising, canonical conceptual and feminist art, fashion and graphic design in their posters, photographs, sculptures, performances, and videos. By proposing a feminist land art retreat, yet perpetually suspending its manifestation, FLAR opens a space to consider the social and cultural paradigms that construct femininity, nature and solitude.

Free Rein features a new video work titled No Man's Land which witnesses the lives of horses, the women who work with them, and the landscapes they share. With attention to interiority and intimacy, FLAR pictures the interdependence and influence between these sentient beings in their daily routines of work and pleasure.

FLAR initiated this project through close observation of tropes within the western film genre, grand gestures of earth art, and colonial allegories in space exploration that have yoked the sovereignty of land, elements, animals and women to men's vision. Working with strategies of feminist cinema, science fiction symbolism and social utopianism, No Man's Land proposes alternative images of freedom and autonomy to the lone ranger or

intrepid explorer. Through their feminist lens, the concept of "no man's land" is mercurial: it is land free from the presence and pressure of man, land relations beyond ownership and a space beyond the rein of the image.

Parallel to the exhibition, FLAR will present a new work, Transmissions, on the Pattison billboard at the corner of West Hastings St. and Abbott St. Aligned with this public exhibition, FLAR will also produce a new poster series that will be available in the gallery and disseminated around the city.

Marshall is the recipient of 2015 Americans for the Arts National Award, 2014 Wolfgang Hahn Prize, 1997 MacArthur Foundation Grant, among other distinctions. He lives and works in Chicago.

Rennie Museum opened in October 2009 in historic Wing Sang, the oldest structure in Vancouvers Chinatown, to feature dynamic exhibitions comprising only of art drawn from Rennie Collection. Showcasing works by international artists, the

Feathers, Ether, Sand, Speech presents three contemporary Vancouver artists working at the intersection of performance and media art, and exploring sites of contested gender representation: the cinema, the landscape, and the strip club. Lauren Marsden, Elizabeth Milton and Sydney Southam experiment with the presence and absence of the body to articulate their concerns surrounding labour, materiality, and documentation within performance art.

Lauren Marsden's work, Miss Department of Energy Has Left The Building (2009-2018), invokes a mythological 1950s promotional pin-up character, standing in the ambivalent space between a controversial nuclear energy station, and the serenity of the California beachfront. The work calls us the notion of "the evaporated performer"; when no trace of the performer's body remains at the site, the leftover material must stand in as representative of the performance itself. With *Punching A Pillow Until The* Sun Rises (2017), Elizabeth Milton staged a hysterical melodrama of a diva caught in a tragic-comic cycle of perpetual destruction. Adapted from a twelve-hour performance, this split-screen recording emphasizes her interest in the relationship between live performance, documentation and mediated experience. Drawing on her experiences as a professional pole dancer, stripper and performance artist, **Sydney Southam**'s *A Glorious Moment* is a new artwork created for this exhibition. Translating aspects of feminized and sexualized labour into a material object, Southam's work draws on the overlap of bodily performance in stripping, and the bodily labour performed in feminized domestic work, such as sewing and mending; skills often acquired by strippers who make their own costumes.

The artists' various uses or refusal of documentation highlight the function of a photograph or video to capture a particular form of spectatorship. In challenging the voyeurship that surrounds female performance art, the artists present alternative perspectives that emphasize not the physical body, but its absence. The physical presence of the artist is not wholly visible; what we see are the piles of sand, the discarded blanket, or the woman in the screen, and what we sense is the ether that seems to haunt the space.

Sickness demarcates the messiness, ugliness, and inexplicable nature of disease, bringing us back to the original meaning of disease as dis-ease. What does it mean to be sick, as opposed to being ill? What directions might critical disability studies, mad studies, sexual diversity studies, and queer theory take us as we reconsider what it means to be sick? With Sick Theories, we bring together scholars, writers, artists, activists, and educators to untangle the relationships between sickness and sexuality. Description of residency programCasa na Ilha is a creative retreat in Ilhabela Island, Brazil, an ecological paradise and preservation area at 200 km from Sao Pablo.Casa Na Ilha is based in a colonial house in the island of Ilhabela, Brazil. The Residency Program is an initiative born from the idea of artists from different disciplines to create a space where creativity is encouraged, focusing in the construction of the creative process, development and curatorial process of artistic and environmental engaged projects in one place away from the city and distractions of daily routine.

Casa Na Ilha Residency programs runs in a house built by an artist above the sea level. It is 800 metres from the beach and 4 km away from the island historical center and town,

Is emplaced in the middle of the rainforest on the top of a hill, surrounded with nature and a breathtaking view to the ocean, beach, palm trees and mountains.

Located north in the island, the house is walking distance from the beach and waterfalls. The absolute peace and tranquility of the place are perfect for feeding inspiration and disconnection with the world today that generally cause blockages between the artist and their work. Close to natural waterfalls, a garden full of flowers, trees, orchards, and spring water supplies, birds and ocean sounds, creates the perfect environment to relax the mind and focus on projects.

The residency program promotes the development of projects in all stages, from conception of the idea to the presentation of the same.

Artists work on a self-directed residency: you will have uninterrupted, self-directed work time. We will not pressure you to deliver finished work; you can focus solely on research and development of ideas. However, during your stay there will be a tutor on location 24/7 to discuss ideas, projects and progress of work during the duration of the residency time, respecting artists pace and direction. We do not provide a set program or itinerary for artists to follow, sessions and tutor advice and support will be approached personally case by case around artists self directed practices. Tutor will give you guidance as well as help make the necessary contacts, approaches and arrangements with different parties the project requires.

OverviewIn the age of alt-facts, deeply researched reporting is more crucial than ever to the viability of an informed citizenry and a healthy democracy. Investigative reporters craft the stories that form the heart of our public discourse. These stories require advanced technical skills, but over the past decade, data transparency laws have been empowering all writers to explore their ideas more fully than ever before. This program teaches nonfiction writers and journalists to use investigative research techniques as they create compelling narratives. Participants will discuss the critical conversation around media and democracy.

What does the program offer? This residency provides a wide-ranging introduction to the use of investigative research in nonfiction writing. Through a combination of interactive seminars and workshops, participants will learn to identify research sources, extract the necessary information, and turn data and interviews into rich, engaging narratives.

Morning seminars will teach techniques ranging from handling adversarial interviews to digitally-assisted reporting to navigating freedom of information laws. Afternoon workshops will be devoted to the application of these skills in crafting a narrative and reviewing participants' works.

Imagine a new dream project in a place so beautiful, it is said to exist between heaven and earth.

Description of residency program

In the Wilds of Amalfi, we will immerse ourselves in the sensory pleasures of our natural surroundings and connect with the wild energies that nurture creation through educational wild plant hikes, farm visits, shared meals, and trips to the trails, towns, and beaches that dot this wild coast.

From our home in a frescoed X Century former Byzantine Monastery carved from the cliffs over the sea, near one of the smallest villages in Italy, six creative thinkers will enjoy occasional shared meals on the terrace and the freedom of an unlimited weekday bus pass.

While we take time to explore and conceive of new perspectives, narratives, mythologies, and possibilities for our own art practice or dream project, we will share in selected readings, curator talks, group discussions, and resources to create an incubator for new ideas and approaches in the global contemporary art-world. Our schedule favours free time for internal and external exploration, and our time together will serve to introduce like minds and form new connections, infusing our awareness with exponential perspective and sense of possibility.

Separately and together, we will immerse our senses in natural beauty and cultural legacies to inspire new ideas, research and develop our own project proposal, or invent a new origin story in a supportive, reflective, explorative, inspired learning utopia.

In so doing, we will be the sparks for what this interdisciplinary, thematically evolving, nomadic wilderness residency will create and become.

If given a kingdom, what would you create?

Duration of residency

This 8 night, 10 day residency holds scheduled activities and free work or exploration time from October 1-8, 2018. Artists are welcomed and recommended to arrive anytime throughout the day on Sunday September 30th, and settle in to our accommodations at their leisure until an evening orientation session, with official welcome and introductions followed by a celebratory group dinner. The week concludes on Monday October 8th with a final group breakfast and discussion.

Disciplines, work equipment and assistance

We invite creative thinkers of all disciplines and artists of all media. For this project, the curatorial team is seeking to create a dynamic multi-disciplinary group of like

minds from diverse backgrounds, approaches and experiences.

We welcome application by artists working in: site specific work, land-based art, conceptual art, installation, painting, photography, textiles, ceramics, sculpture, writing, poetry, music, sound, film, dance, movement, social intervention, etc., as well as philosophers, activists, teachers, naturalists, scientists, experience designers, and adventurers.

The common threads that the curators will be looking for to connect the diverse group of creatives while we "Wonder Up A World" is: an intention to create your own reality, imagine an epic new project, re-imagine your own art practice, or create an idea for a new body of work that is self-referential, or is of an intrinsically unconventional approach, and is essentially a creation of your own world.

We are committed to artist support and on this internationally collaborative travelling residency we provide:

- Project development consultation and curatorial support.
- Lectures, talks, group discussion, mastermind skill-share.
- Thematically curated suggested readings and resources.
- Free time for research, exploration, pleasure, and creation.
- Unlimited use public bus pass on weekdays for personal exploration of the coastal towns and villages via local SITA bus, which stops regularly on the road just below the residence and visits most other stops along the coast hourly.
- Private van and driver to our group wild-food hiking excursion above Positano.
- Assistance with pickup locally from public transit upon arrival and departure.
- Breakfast and one other meal is provided daily.
- All meals listed in the schedule are included (average of 2 meals daily).
- Depending on the days activities, we alternate between shared meals and self catering or local culinary exploration. Breakfast followed by home cooked or picnic lunches some days and family-style dinners other nights bring us together throughout the week to share in a feast of the local fields, farms, and sea. This meeting of the minds and breaking bread together fuels our connection and inspiration, while allowing for enjoyment of the countless local restaurants and café's during free time in-between.
- Onsite café on a terrace below our residence is available for a la carte: coffee, afternoon cocktails or a sunset nightcap without leaving home.
- Guided teaching hikes including Il Sentiero Degli Dei: The Walk Of The Gods.
- Wild food foraging educational hike.
- Visit to a working farm.
- Outdoor wild food cooking class.
- Local wine and liqueur tastings.
- Excursions to Minori, Ravello, Atrani, Furore, Nocelle, Montepertuso, and Positano.

Accommodation

A X Century former Byzantine monastery, carved from caves in the cliffs suspended over the sea and famous coastal road has three centuries of frescoes below our top-floor apartment, and is an inspiring setting for retreat as well as providing easy access by local bus to the many natural wonders, historic villages and iconic towns of the Amalfi Coast. Participants may choose either a private room with double bed, or a

shared room with two twin beds. Individuals as well as partners are equally welcomed.

Studio/workspace

While conventional studio space is not provided, the wilderness is our laboratory, the dining room our drawing room, the living room our library, and the two private terraces are our shared reflection, connection, and creation spaces.

Because this residency is largely for purposes of research and inspiration, rather than studio based creation, we invite you to explore new ideas in an inspiring environment and be inspired by each other.

On the first morning of the residency, each participant will enjoy a one-on-one consult with the curator to talk about their needs and expectations for the week. For example, if an artist would like to work on some painting on our private terrace, and another artist would like to reserve the same space for dance or movement work, the curator will work with the group and schedule to assist and support artists in meeting any needs and expectations in the best way possible.

Fees and support

Total cost for this 8 night, 10 day artist residency and adventure retreat including seaside accommodations, all programming, three scheduled hiking excursions, weekday transportation, and two daily meals:

- Shared twin room \$1950 CAD per person.
- Private double room \$2650 CAD per person.

Elsewhere is a choose-your-own-adventure style residency, providing residents with the opportunity to connect with the community... or just time to focus on work.

Elsewhere exists in the heart of the small town of Paonia, Colorado, located at the base of Lamborn Mountain in the West Elks on the western slope of the Rockies - west of Delta, and about 1.5 hours from Grand Junction. The town itself has a population of 1500, but the surrounding mesas hold another 5000. It is surrounded by orchards, farms, and vineyards.

Open Call Deadline: July 7th for Winter 2019 residencies beginning between January 2019 and April 2019.

Duration of residency

Time spans are individually based - 1 to 6 months, accommodating 4 to 6 artists at a time.

Disciplines, work equipment and assistance

We welcome visual artists, writers, composer/musicians, performance artists at any stage of their careers as well as scientists, activists, teachers, students, or any kind of creative thinker interested in exploring and expanding their work in a supportive environment.

All rooms and spaces in the main house have radiant in-floor heat. There is also a large wood stove in living room of house as a supplemental heat/cooking system. We have a washer and dryer for resident use. Residents are responsible for their own meals. The fully equipped main floor kitchen is shared by Suite, Loft Room, and Gingerbread House residents. Grocery store, banks, library, theater, pubs, post office, etc. are easy walking distance from Elsewhere. Elsewhere also has bicycles available for residents' use.

Studio/ workspace The studio space on the Main Floor is shared by the residents in the Loft Room and Gingerbread House . The Suite (top floor) is living and studio space combined. The Basement Apartment is also living and studio space combined. There is a small woodworking shop on the property with table saw, chop saw, and a variety of power and hand tools available for artist use. There are performing art spaces available in Paonia that can be contracted for dance and theater. There is also an off-site ceramics co-op for residents to use for an additional fee. Elsewhere has an Epson 3880 Professional Ink Jet Printer, our local branch library has an Epson Artisan 1430 Printer & and Epson Perfection V600 Photoscanner as well as GoPro Camera's (for checkout). Our local branch library has a MAC Computer associated with the equipment listed above & they have some software, too, including the Adobe Creative Suite.

Fees and supportResidency fees are \$600 to \$850 per month, which includes housing, utilities, and WiFi.

Expectations towards the artistElsewhere is a choose-your-own-adventure style residency. Situated in downtown Paonia, the spaces are versatile, providing residents with opportunities to connect and interact with other artists in the community, to create or participate in art exhibitions, and to teach classes or workshops. Residents are expected to participate in two events per month: a "Meet-n-Greet" at the beginning of the month to introduce themselves and their work to the community, as well as an "Open Studio" at the end of the month as part of Final Friday Artwalk. Artists are also expected to keep a clean workspace and common area as well as posting at least one blog post to the website during their stay.

Application informationElsewhere has three deadlines per year: March 7th for residencies beginning in the months of September to December, July 7th for residencies beginning in the months of January to April, and November 7th for residencies beginning in the months of May to August.
