

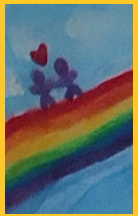

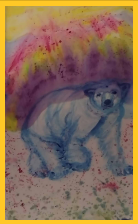

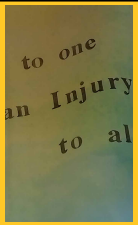
4 & 5. Walking to Survive - Penny Lim

3. Boots - Ade Leke

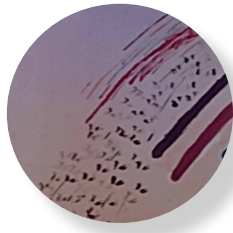
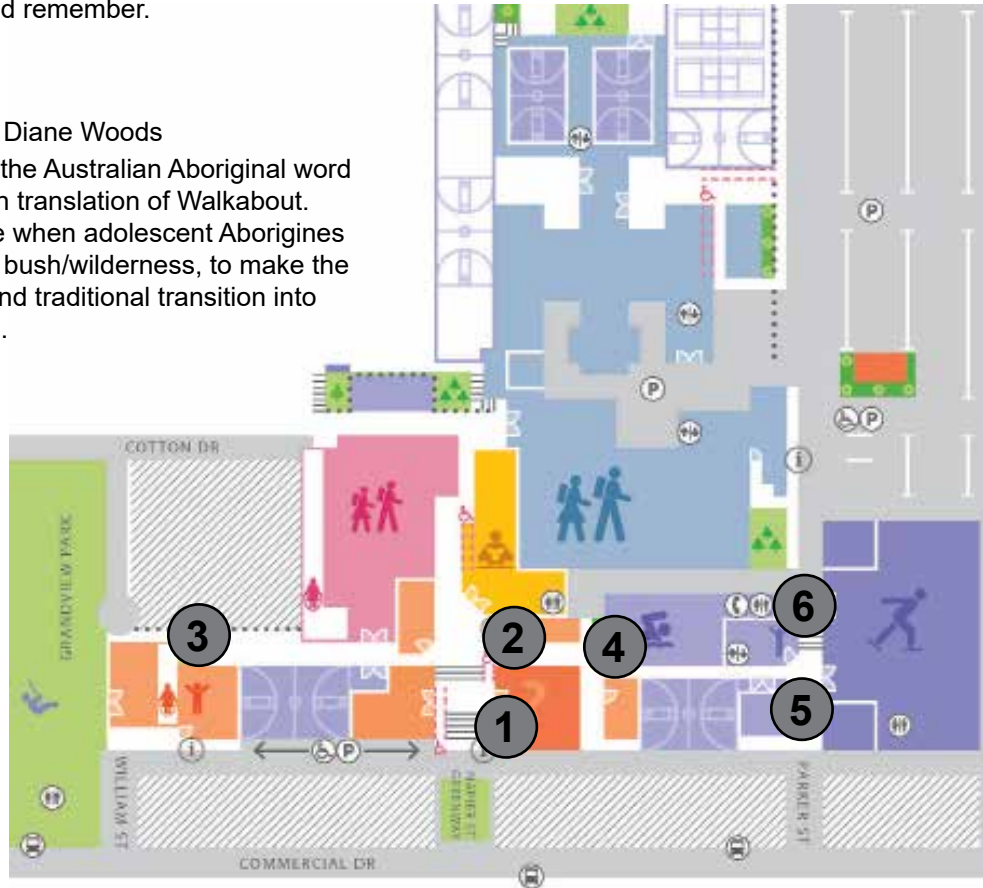
Because of a rare foot shape and walking difficulties, Ade makes his own shoes and boots. He used his templates directly on the banners. (Helen)
