Board Meeting of December 10th, 2014 there was some re-aligning of the agenda in order to accommodate presentations and guests.

1. PRESENTATION:

Fern Jeffries and Carole Brown attended to discuss Place Based Strategies – presented a power point to the Board with history and focus.

Common conditions in successful place based collective impact strategies (notes from the session)

We need to refocus on people and place: "people live in places, contribute to places and are affected by places. Poverty and disadvantage are mediated by place, and places are affected by the poverty or otherwise of their inhabitants." (Griggs et al, 2008)

Our Place is collaboration among residents, community organizations, and local business and community leaders in Vancouver's Inner City (urban).

Our mission is to develop our neighborhood to be a place where children and their families have access to needed resources that promote full inclusion; where school readiness is the norm; and where neighborhood's value and support women, children, youth and families.

Our Place envisions a future in which residents can provide for their basic needs for good food and safe shelter within the community; and parents have sufficient

Several community organizations joined with other partners to develop a response-producing a document called "Succeed in Strathcona." This called for efforts (place based) that incorporated all transitions points.

There was agreement on the need to build local capacity and local organizations to lead the change, and secure willingness on the part of all partners to integrate services and investments.

Recognizing where change happens is in our local neighborhoods and communities, local groups, parents and those wanting to see different outcomes came together in a PLACE



Based on a comprehensive collective Impact approach. It was agreed to call this Our Place representing the partnership of residents, community-based organizations, and service providers working collaboratively to support the growth, education and healthy, safe development of children in Vancouver's inner city. Resources were limited in the beginning so the partners started with a focus on the early years.

Working in OUR PLACE partners agreed to work as a collective using a strategic approach with common vision and setting key result areas e.g. Enhanced Child Development and yearly targets and outcomes. Not a single program, but a collection of actions that improve access, address barriers, and enhance existing programs and opportunities. A scatter gun approach, the concentration was on Early Years – getting children school ready with supports they needed. This was not about a single organization or program but about children and families and relevant effective action by a number of partners including residents to improve outcomes.

An important part was the tracking and measurement of the work-e.g. improved child health but also addressed increasing childcare and early learning spaces. We joined with the School in creating a robust Strong Start program and created over 65 new early learning spaces for vulnerable children. Trained over 50 parents in early childhood and 32% obtained jobs and all volunteered in early childhood programs. Meetings with MCFD childcare subsidy branch saw major change in practice and policy re-alignment to create and enhance access to 100's of low income inner city parents who had been unable to negotiate the 23 page application process-with direct access for OUR PLACE to problem solving & decision makers at the senior ministry level.

Here we are 6 years later....from 70% vulnerability to 52%

In 2012 inspired by the results being recorded in the Early Years work OURPLACE partners were already beginning the work of putting together the details that now addressed all the transitions through to post-secondary in addition to the early childhood to kindergarten transitions that had been the focus of the first 5 years.

It was dubbed the OURPLACE `THE GRADUATION STRATEGY'

Like the early childhood work done previously-it involved collective impact and a scatter gun approach-no one organization or single program but an effort strategically addressing components required to make successful transitions but now with a focus also on middle and high school years.

Some examples of current planning challenges:

- -8:30 am -4:30 pm Service Provision Model-resources not available when needed by youth in crisis.
- -Safe House policy-many vulnerable youth do not have access -Conditioned Responses to first exclude, or stream children/youth presenting with difficulties into a separate group(s) away from mainstream (school, community programs)
- -Current public recreation /community program delivery barriers to inclusion-cost, capacity to accommodate and embrace differences
- -A set of systems that works from deficits of individuals-not their strengths
- Use of single program response to address complex problems that require comprehensive solutions-often with multiple strategies/programs.



Carole and Fern were thanked for their presentation.

2. Britannia Carving Pavilion

District Principal Don Fiddler – Carving Pavilion.

Don stated he wanted to express his appreciation for the community as we have undertaken this project. It has been truly a community effort. We have had initial support Native Housing, School Board amongst others.

Briefing note was circulated on the pavilion –. We feel art is an excellent way to get kids involved. As students learn a skill they are able to apply that makes something that is saleable. Mask - \$100 that is money they would not have and they learn how it makes a difference. It has been a long journey; I want to express my appreciation for all that Cynthia has been doing with this project. We are limited in School Board funding as they have a \$21,000,000 deficit. Geoff Taylor has been very important to the project.

Kindred Construction – Cynthia circulated a briefing note on the pavilion. – phase I wrap up is planned for December 19th – Britannia will be out of pocket \$246,176 and the funds for this will come out of Britannia un-invested operating funds of \$500,000 forfeiting about \$350 month of interest.

Discussion on the Board approval of funds. We have confirmed funding yet to be received of \$182,530 we will receive those funds in 2015. Deficit funding is being pursued. We are hoping for a VanCity Grant from their 2015 Community Grants. We are hoping the VSB can cover the fire suppression system. There are funds on reserve pending occupancy. We can also make application to gaming in February. January or February is the expected occupancy.

We will pursue funding for phase 2. Phase I \$63,646 deficit. Phase II projected costs \$91,450 and no construction will start until the funding is secured. We can implement programming without phase ii and the plan is to implement programming in February.

It was suggested we strike a committee to review and bring back a report.

- Programming what are the timelines, what are the programs? Community involvement for the space.
- Cynthia shared with City of Vancouver Health and Wellness Committee that we hope to have the program operate 24/7.
- During the day time school projects, various schools, considered access to all district schools.
- We have a tremendous interest in aboriginal culture and art. Britannia will be responsible for programming for the community.
- We hope to start carving a canoe in February. We hope to get the funding for some resident carvers. There is interest by carvers, who have stated they see the building as being a great opportunity.
- Various art projects, etc.
- Training opportunity and play.
- We were interested in projects that help guard our kids and projects.
- , it will take time to build the focus in schools and I believe this will be really well used.

B) VCC LEARNING CENTRE – there was a briefing note circulated from Morna McLeod – December 10, 2014. 6. Old Business – Budget – the documents were circulated with the mailing.

- Version 3 page 1 is reconciliation for the finance committee benefit as to how we got to version 3 from version 2. Including recommendations of the Finance Committee.

Budget Summary – 2015 surplus \$18,788

City has included collective agreement increases.

Community Education zero based – Mike Evens Community Education - Open Door to Learning the program has been eliminated.

Family Literacy self-funding

We sent in changes with staffing - Pool Programmer out of Pool, Rink Programmer out of Rink, Seniors Programmer out of Centre budget.

Capital Maintenance dollars. City looking at rink operation and maintenance costs.

Page 5 discretionary budget – we expect slightly less money this year in the child care fees. Administration expenses are locked. Page 7 and 8 is a summary. Revenues and costs on pages 7 and 8.

Finance should look at the programs every month and keep the programs on budget or decide that we are letting the program go over.

Balancing the budget lines – discussion on the youth programming budget and do we wish to consider requested a balanced bottom line.

Looking at each program and review in more detail.

Finance Committee will look at the reports every month starting in January and have an expectation that they have input into it.

What would we lose in these budget areas if each area were requested to come at a balanced budget?

We have budgeted for a net surplus; there are some areas that cost, some that produce revenue. There is a significant increase in arts budget this year. This budget is also dependent on gaming revenue.

It is the Board's role to look at these issues. I would like a recommendation to the Finance Committee and a detailed explanation provided to the February Board.

If you have questions let Natalie know, or if you want a particular layout let Natalie know. Certain programs don't make revenue but they are what the Britannia Board has decided they want to do in this community.

Some capital expenditure, they looked at some space, they may come along. Micro Footie Jason Kyle there is no Britannia Soccer Academy I am not proposing a Britannia Soccer Academy. Jason and I have discussed pass program in Burnaby, right now attaching another program with program needs to the school will not work for us. Any school in this district can work with an organization to accommodate scheduling for students. There is not a soccer academy. There is support for what Jason is trying to do.
